Format of Midterms and Exams:

Exams will be held on eClass. Exams will be open book, multiple choice, and more detail will be added to eClass as we approach the exam date.

Attendance: Attendance is not required, however, it is imperative that you keep up-to-date with course material. Failure to do so will almost certainly negatively impact your grade average.

Representative Evaluative Material:

Practice Midterms will be provided on eClass.

Missed Term Exams and Assignments:

For an excused absence where the cause is religious belief, a student must contact the instructor(s) within two weeks of the start of Fall or Winter classes to request accommodation for the term (including the final exam, where relevant). Instructors may request adequate documentation to substantiate the student request.

A student who cannot write a term Midterm or complete a term assignment due to incapacitating illness, severe domestic affliction or other compelling reasons must contact the instructor. Email within 48 hours of missed term Midterm or deadline. In most circumstances, the weight will be distributed across other similar assessments (Midterms; final exam). Transferring the weight of missed work to the final exam could result in not being approved for a deferred final examination as they may not have completed the required 50% of term work. Instructors should warn students about this possibility.

In all cases, instructors may request adequate documentation to substantiate the reason for the absence, at their discretion.

Deferral of term work is a privilege and not a right; there is no guarantee that a deferral will be granted. Misrepresentation of Facts to gain a deferral is a serious breach of the *Code of Student Behaviour*.

Deferral of term work/exams is under the discretion of the instructor, however, a student must apply to their Faculty for a deferral of a final exam, see below.

Deferred Final Examination: A student who cannot write the final examination due to incapacitating illness, severe domestic affliction or other compelling reasons can apply to their Faculty for a deferred final examination. Students who failed at the start of term to request exam accommodations for religious beliefs are expected to follow the normal deferred final examination process. Such an application must be made to the student's Faculty office within two working days of the missed examination and must be supported by appropriate documentation or a Statutory Declaration (see Calendar for information on [Attendance](#)).
