Course Description: The study of the profession of clinical psychology, including topics such assessment and diagnosis, judgment and decision making, and psychotherapeutic interventions.

Course Prerequisites: PSYCO 239. Not open to students with credit in PSYCO 435.

It is important to prepare yourself for this course through a review of the prerequisite material. Students who do not have the required prerequisites at the time of taking this course should not expect supplementary support from the instructor.

Course Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes: At the conclusion of this course students should have an understanding of the field of clinical psychology including how clinical psychologists are trained, how the field is regulated and the scope of the work clinical psychologists engage in. Particular attention will be paid to ethical issues in clinical psychology.

Students will complete two short written assignments.

Policy on Late Work:

Assignments submitted late, for <u>any</u> reason, will be penalized 3% from the assignment grade per each calendar day (or part thereof) up to a maximum of one week at which point you will receive a grade of 0. For example, if you submit the final paper between 11:55pm on the due date and 11:54pm on the next calendar day, you would lose 3%. All assignments will be submitted via eClass and technical difficulties with this process will NOT be accepted as exemption from the late penalty. Submit your assignments early to avoid these problems.

TESTS

The 4 small tests will be online, open book tests in eClass. They will consist of 10-12 multiple choice or true/false questions and 1 – 3 short answer questions. Each test will be available from 9:00am until 11:55pm on the date listed (you must be finished by 11:55pm). Once you begin the test you will **only have 30 minutes to complete it**. If you lose connection you will be able to return to the test so long as it is within the time limit.

The questions will be conceptual/applied so you will not be able to quickly search for answers in your materials and the time limit is quite short. Please study the material as you would for a regular, in-person exam. You will not have time to review information from your notes or text during the tests.

Format of Final Exam:

The final exam will be an online open book exam in eClass. It will consist of about 55 multiple choice questions approximately 10 short answer questions and you will have 120 minutes to complete the exam.

As with the tests, questions will be very conceptual in their style and the answers will not easily be found in your notes and text. I strongly recommend you study the material as you would for a regular, in-person exam. You will not have time to search for information during the limited exam time.
